

- 8. It is a very godly ministry; board meetings are often like good church services. Members of the board are so godly, easy to get along with. God called me to it for now.



A little over a year ago we as a director team faced the question, "We are a prison ministry with all these chaplains and we're not allowed in the prisons, what are we going to do?"

In the book of Acts, Paul and his companions had aspirations

to evangelize in the province of Asia but "the Spirit of Jesus did not allow them." Soon afterwards Paul had a vision of a man from Macedonia saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." (Acts 16:7-9) Paul had his plans, but God thought differently.

In early 2020 we had our plans, but by the middle of March all of our chaplains were suddenly out of work. It would be four to six months before most of them were allowed back into prison. Even then things would be different. So how have our chaplains fared over the past 15 months?

We had to learn to be flexible. While our chaplains were denied entrance into prison, we encouraged them to find alternative forms of ministry. A number of chaplains began investing a significant amount of time in helping returning citizens acclimate back into society. Finding a job, acquiring transportation, and obtaining a Social Security number and

driver's license are just a few of the needs returning citizens have during their first few weeks out of prison. COVID didn't stop people from being released. Some chaplains occasionally worked at our thrift stores doing maintenance or sorting clothing. In South Alabama we had work fixing roofs and cleaning up in the community after Hurricane Sally. Many prison facilities in Alabama allowed us to hold services outside the fence. An associate chaplain in Ohio started compiling and printing a newsletter of faith articles and getting it into prison every two weeks for distribution to the men.

After finally being allowed back in prison, our chaplains had to find ways to adapt to the new environment. In some cases, the chapels had been turned into COVID hospitals. One chaplain improvised by holding classes in the chow hall; another is using the visitation room. In many institutions our chaplains are currently the only ones available for spiritual guidance.

We are thankful for what we are able to do and for the favor and trust we have been given. We look forward to the time when more of you can again join us in events like ReNew Hope and Softball. Until then we all need to be faithful with what is in front of us. I've been challenged recently with this thought, "Our environment and context might change, but our calling to make Christ known does not."

en love to conquer! We love to go to the next level in everything. It is how we are wired. In prison this desire is



squelched. There are no "levels" to climb. For the most part everyone receives the same rations, supplies, etc., although a man with plenty of money on his books can gain a competitive edge. But even in the prison setting, something resonates with men when you begin discussing "greatness."

Recently, I went through a study with some of the guys about being a great man of God. All of us were challenged that God's greatness scale is not based on outward circumstances or characteristics but on inward qualities. This means that even in prison men can embrace "kingdom greatness." As they allow God to transform them into His image, they can grow to the next level in spiritual maturity. I encourage the guys to embrace the calling God has for them, even if they can't see what it is yet. I know God has something for them if they choose to walk in His ways instead of their own.

I have been doing a lot of classes and Bible studies with the men since last September. It has been great to see some of these guys grow spiritually to the next level. Sometimes it is difficult to tell when we gain another level, but when we notice that things don't bother us like they used to, that is one sign of growth. Other signs include obedience to God's Word in a new area of life and love for others in a new way.

As I watch these men of God study and apply scripture, it is evident to me that they are conquering and growing. I have seen men quit negative habits. I have seen men develop a love for the Word of God. I have seen men grow in patience and forbearance. It is not only evident to me. It is evident to other inmates and to officers. It is why when there was a count time recently in the middle of a church service, the officer stopped his count long enough to grab a microphone and join in the singing as we worshipped God! One of the men looked at me and said, "You know this is only God, because there is nothing else that we all have in common."

This is conquering! As men start seeing others in the identity of God and not in the identity of their job or social rank, someone just went to another level...spiritually!

This is how we conquer both in prison and outside of prison. This is how we achieve kingdom greatness. I am thankful for the opportunities to study the Word of God with these men and to grow with them. I encourage all of us to go on to perfection and maturity. Let's not stop conquering!

n working with the ladies at Tutwiler, I am encouraged time and again. Some have been raised in good families and have



knowledge of the Word. When they come to prison, many of them come face to face with the opportunity to reevaluate their lives. I've heard other statements such as "I didn't know how much I liked flowers until I came here," indicating the speaker has learned to appreciate the little things. I often hear in regards to time, "Man can say one thing but God may say another."

Since most volunteers are still unable to go inside the prison, We Care Program, as well as some other ministries, have had outside-the-fence services, with music, singing and a message. It's encouraging to watch the ladies raise their hands in praise to God as He moves in hearts. A lady who had spent 25 years as an inmate at Tutwiler spoke recently at one of the services. She had said she was never coming back, unless God told her to. Some of the ladies in attendance knew her from having served time with her. She gave a powerful testimony of where God had brought her from. She also shared about the ministry she works in today, helping women like herself readjust into life outside. We truly serve a God who redeems, a God who forgives and a God of second chances. I love seeing the smiles on the faces of the ladies. Truly, faith is the victory that overcomes the world.

y friend James is an elderly inmate who could easily harbor a bitter attitude towards life and others in general.



Yet he has persevered through years of incarceration and poor health and still has the ability to see beyond himself and care for others. One topic we have talked about quite a bit is family life. It's interesting to hear of his experiences raising children in an entirely different era. For one, it sounds like the switch and belt were employed more frequently in those days! In some ways, times may have been simpler then but not necessarily easier. A few weeks ago James told me he prays for my family and me each day. That was both humbling and touching to hear. It reminds me of another incarcerated individual who penned these words in Philippians 1:3-4, "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine making request for you all with joy." James' commitment to pray for me has been both challenging and convicting.

I've been blessed to know many godly individuals over the years at G.K. Fountain; men who also say with Paul, "I have learned in whatever state I am, to be content. I know how to live humbly and to abound...to be full and to be hungry." (Philippians 4:11-12) Only a relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ can account for this peace in James' life and countless others. Walking with the Lord, in fellowship with Him, brings about real change; a heart change that allows them to see beyond the temporal and live for the eternal. If you will, take a minute to pray for James and believers like him to press on. I'll let him know that a few friends and I are just returning the favor!

Have you ever had a job with a boss who was difficult to work for? Such a situation


can be
