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ReNew Hope 2024 felt both familiar and different when compared to pre-COVID years. While some things will never be the same again, we made some great strides in that direction. For the first time since 2020, the Sunday orientation was again held in the Montgomery area. This year also saw our largest group of volunteers going into the most prisons since 2020. Praise God with us for these steps of progress.

Our time together on Sunday consisted of worship in song led by various music groups, a message from Michael Liles, and some final training input by Kevin Kennell. After fellowshipping over a light meal, the volunteers spread across the state in preparation to begin serving on Monday morning. Those whose assignments were not in the Montgomery area, dispersed to either Atmore, Troy, or Birmingham.

Monday morning, and each morning thereafter, started differently than in the past. Instead of a group session at the beginning of the day, the volunteer teams went directly into the prisons for their visitation ministry. After connecting with the state chaplains, teams were able (for the most part) to go to various parts of the prisons where they could meet the men and women "on their turf." At all but one prison, the chapel services were held during the day instead of in the evening. Some of the services in Florida were even held

first thing in the morning. The music groups, families and individual singers who shared in song were greatly appreciated by the inmates. Anything out of the "norm" is a huge blessing for those in prison. With the music groups, speakers and volunteers all sharing their talents and the love of Christ, the men and women in prison were extra blessed during ReNew Hope.

Because of the early morning start in the prisons, teams then exited the institutions in late afternoon. This schedule enabled a first for ReNew Hope this year. All the volunteers in each area were treated to a meal each evening, Monday – Wednesday. The meal was provided by We Care and served by a team of volunteers. Following the meal was a time of worship, input, and sharing stories and testimonies from that day's ministry in the prisons. Of course, there was also plenty of fellowship with friends both old and new.

We praise God for the lives that were impacted through this event. Not only were the lives of men and women in prison impacted, but so were the lives of the officers and staff at each prison where we served, as well as the lives of the ReNew Hope participants. Souls were saved, the church on the inside was encouraged, and volunteers who served had their lives forever changed. Thank you to everyone who helped make this outreach possible in both large and small ways.

to do the study!!! It's exciting... There is light starting to shine in our dorm. I feel so blessed to be here right now. I have been so depressed and unmotivated, but I was not seeing what God was doing all around me. I asked you about King Saul and my fear that God was done with me like he was with Saul, but it was self-pity. God was here the whole time. God's not done with me and I'm not done with Him anyway. A sixth man just asked me to be involved while I'm writing this! So please send 6 copies of the Bible study courses (and two more Bibles). Thank you and have a great day! Your friend, James"

This note was on a request slip we recently received at the chaplain's office. "James" is in a protective housing dorm, which is somewhat a "prison within prison." It is generally a restrictive and unpleasant place to do time. But in the middle of this particularly discouraging environment, there is "light starting to shine." There is a hunger to study the Word. I was so blessed and encouraged by this glimpse into God's ongoing work and presence in the dorm.

I gathered the requested materials and quickly penned a response, ending with 1 Corinthians 15:58, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." Praise the Lord for the work He is doing in James' life and others around him!

We serve a living God, a God who wants us to do His work right where we are called to. I believe He draws us

to Himself and asks us to join Him where He is at work. I am learning more about what God is doing in the world around me "behind the fence," and He is asking me to join Him there.

I am teaching the class "Experiencing God," two groups of 40 each. Some of the men are new in the faith, others are experienced in the faith, and others are wondering where they belong. All are hearing the word of God. As I plant the seed, I pray it will fall on good ground and produce fruit. It takes time and patience for the seeds to grow and bring forth fruit, and the yield is not always the same. God gives the increase.

After class I stay and chat with the guys at their "rack" and discuss what they are learning in the class. One day after chatting with an individual for a while, he said, "Six months ago I thought I was going to heaven on good works and because I am a good person, but today I don't know if I am saved." I shared with him the plan of salvation and assured him that if he confesses his sins and believes that Jesus died for him the Bible says he will be saved. "I finally get it," he said. "Thank you, Chaplain Steve." Another time I spoke with a man who needed some encouragement to not give up but to keep on the path God has for him. The journey is not easy, but God works through the valleys and hard lessons enabling us to

grow in Christ and become more like Him.

These men challenge and encourage me to grow and be the person God created me to be. They are my fellow comrades. One man, who is a Christian pillar in the dorm, told me, "I am your brother in Christ. Let us encourage one another to do good works."

"C haplain Dave, will you please give me an application and consider me for a bed in your Pathway to Freedom (PTF) dorm?"



"Good morning, Chaplain Dave, I signed up at (fill in blank) prison to come here to Bibb to take Pathway to Freedom. Are there any beds open?"

"Chap, I have been here at Bibb for four months, and I have not been able to make it into PTF or any of the other program dorms."

"Chap, do you have a spot for me yet?!"

"Dave, how much longer do you think it's gonna be??!!"

"Were you ever even planning to give me a spot in your dorm!?!!"

"I should have never signed up to come here to Bibb!!"

"If I knew it might go like this, I certainly would have stayed at (fill in blank) prison!!!"

You will notice the progression of frustration, even desperation, in these questions and comments. We started PTF in May 2023. Overall, this effort has gone well. Many men's lives have been touched deeply for Christ. Souls have been saved and believers have been strengthened.

But...the beds are full. There are men in the dorm who are definitely "coasting." They came for an easier life in prison, not necessarily to grow in Christ. The battle against complacency is real! Some are still in deep drug or sexual addiction. Some current residents are seeking to live for Jesus and grow in Him every day.

Now let's talk about prospective residents. Some of those are looking for an easier life in prison. Some are looking for a way to "look good" to the parole board. Some are really desiring freedom from addictions and growth in their walk with Christ!

Please pray for God's wisdom as we oversee these men and guide them daily. Pray we have wisdom to help the "fakers" move out to make room for those who God would have reside there. Pray those truly struggling and seeking freedom from bondages would indeed find freedom and victory in Jesus from addictions. Please pray for God's miracles and His power to be very evident through the PTF dorm!





### COLLABORATION, NOT COMPETITION

Often when we think of two teams, we automatically think "competition." On February 9 and 10, two teams joined forces instead of competing. Gospel Echoes Team Prison Ministry held a Freedom Rally at Holman C.F. in Atmore, and We Care assisted them. We Care was blessed and encouraged by

partnering with Gospel Echoes personnel and volunteers for this outreach.

Friday afternoon found the ladies working together in the kitchen at We Care preparing parts of the meal for Saturday. That night when most everyone else went to bed, two of the volunteers fired up a huge smoker and kept the fire burning all night smoking Boston butts to perfection. Other volunteers got up well before daylight to begin cooking baked beans. In spite of rain on Saturday morning,

the We Care and Gospel Echoes teams set up tents at the prison and assembled the plates of food, along with plastic bags containing various literature items and a hand-colored card telling the men Jesus loves them. This was all followed by singing and a message as the meals and literature were distributed to the men.

A few days later we received a letter from an inmate. He wrote, "I want to

thank you for all you're doing for us here at Holman. The gospel concerts, testimony, witnessing, fellowship with all the volunteers. So much smiling faces, joy, encouragement. Prayers, kindness.... The meal was delicious. The personal (cards), prayers, tracts, books, all a great blessing."

I extend a special thanks to Jon and Karleen Sommers for all their work in organizing and leading the Freedom Rally. Through collaboration and cooperation rather than competition, many lives were touched and blessed.
